

SEMICOLONS IN LISTS: PRACTICING THEIR USE

One way to master the use of a semicolon is to replace coordinating conjunctions within a written list. When you see the coordinating conjunction **BUT, OR, YET, FOR, AND, NOR, SO** in the sentences below, substitute a semicolon instead; you'll get the hang of it in no time!
